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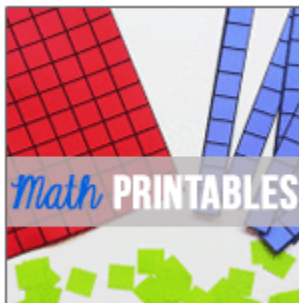

Play: Draw a card, answer the question. If you answer correctly, spin the wagon wheel to see how many spaces you can move your player.

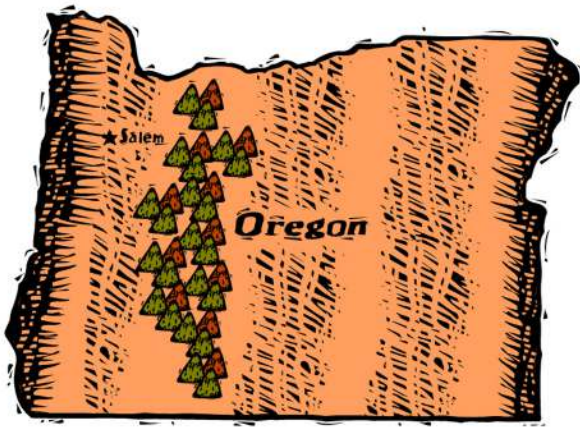
